



On The Way

Figures of the Resurrection: Peter

People of faith go overboard. They insist on things that inconvenience life. At least, that's the modern view. Sure, a little bit of religion is acceptable: First Communion, Confirmation, perhaps Christmas and Easter. But anything more than that begins to cut into one's life. So, keep it to a minimum. Now, this delicately limited practice of the faith is kind of like a vaccine: it exposes you to just enough that you're inoculated against the real thing.

"When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he tucked in his garment, for he was lightly clad, and jumped into the sea." Peter can't wait. He interrupts his life. We saw a similar thing on Easter morning. When Mary Magdalene reported the empty tomb, Peter and John ran to see it. We're used to seeing grown men run. But in that culture, well, it just wasn't done. But Peter risked that indignity and ran to see for himself.

In most respects, it's easy for us to identify with Peter. He has an unfeigned, intense devotion to Jesus Christ...but he keeps getting in his own way. We understand that all too well. He wants to give himself completely to the Lord and promises undying fidelity. But as Jesus himself says, "The spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak." Again, we sympathize. We too want to remain loyal but, relying on our own strength, are unable to do so. We return to Christ with pledges of fidelity...only to fall again into varying degrees of denying Him.

But we probably don't identify with Peter when we see him racing in his robes on Easter morning or jumping into the Sea of Tiberias. We might think these things are just another example of Peter acting rashly. Or we might think them in poor taste. Can't he keep his faith in check a little bit? Sure, the resurrection is important, but let's not get carried away.

Peter's actions are an entirely sensible response to the risen Lord. In fact, the only reasonable reaction. He understood what was at stake and he wasn't going to let something like the sea get in his way. He didn't mind doing something so undignified as running to bring him to Christ's glory.

Indeed, there's something wrong with us if we put limits on what we would do to encounter the risen Christ. Given our sympathy for Peter, we should understand why he runs on Easter morning and leaps into the sea. He wants to restore that relationship that means so much to him. Or, rather, he wants our Lord to restore it. He intuits immediately and accurately that Jesus' resurrection also means the restoration of his friendship with him. The risen Christ can help him get out of his own way.

Peter's holy impetuosity is rewarded. Jesus asks him three times, "Do you love me?" It is the opportunity for him to be restored to friendship with Christ, to atone in some small way for his threefold denial. He ran and leapt for just this purpose. That is what the risen Christ should mean for us as well: the opportunity to be restored. If only we imitate Peter's eagerness and holy impatience to see the risen Christ.

Peter's alacrity and carelessness are a rebuke to our sluggishness and safetyism. Yes, we want Christ...but on our own schedule. You know, when the soccer game's over. Yes, we want Christ...but not at the risk of his disrupting our lives too much. Comfort and convenience reign supreme. The last thing we want is to go overboard, when that's precisely what we need to do.

Saint James Charitable Works Update

Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me. (Matthew 25:40)

During our fiscal year through March 31st, Saint James performed the following works of mercy in our community:

- Distributed two bags each of food to 1,557 people through our Food Distribution program
- Provided direct financial assistance totaling \$16,182 to 65 people in need, including rental assistance, help paying bills, and motel nights for the homeless
- Collected and distributed 534 gift cards totaling \$13,350 to six homeless shelters
- Prepared and delivered meals serving 90 people per month for the Christ House shelter
- Provided hot meals weekly to the Falls Church Homeless Shelter
- Collected 10,400 pounds of food for the diocesan St. Lucy Food Project
- Visited and brought cheer to 15 homebound parishioners for Advent
- Provided toys, clothes, and gifts to our "adopted" families in need, including new outreach to Luther Jackson Middle School
- Collected clothes, books, and puzzles for the Seven Corners Children's Center
- Hosted a party for 40 local seniors to celebrate St. Patrick's Day
- Collected over 1,750 pounds of hygiene products for the Catholic Charities mobile unit

Diocesan Retired Priests Collection May 17-18

Next weekend there will be a second collection for our diocesan retired priests. This collection is an opportunity for you to give back to our retired priests who have given the greater part of their lives to serve each of you and our diocesan Church. Currently there are approximately 200 priests, 26 are retired and 17 who will retire in the next 10 years.

Many elder religious worked for years for little to no pay, leaving a large gap in retirement savings. At the same time, fewer religious are able to serve in compensated ministry. Like many Americans, religious communities face the monumental challenge of funding eldercare.
