### On The Way

The Theological Virtues: What Hope is Not

"Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen" (Heb 11:1). This classic definition of faith already indicates a relationship between faith and hope. Specifically, that faith comes first, and hope follows. By faith we know God and by hope we strive for him. Unless we first know him, we cannot strive for him.

Now, since we have already considered faith, we now turn to the theological virtue of hope. Unfortunately, like the word "faith," the word "hope" is often misunderstood. Our use of it here, to indicate a theological virtue, differs drastically from the world's use. So, we should first clarify what we *don't* mean by "hope."

Hope always involves the expectation of or striving for some difficult good. So, people "hope" for good weather or a Commander's victory or to do well on a test. None of these expresses the *theological* virtue of hope. Rather, in these instances people say, "I hope" when what they really mean is "I want." It's not so much a confidence about attaining some future good but a *desire* that it will happen or be accomplished.

There is also the emotion of hope by which we feel confident about attaining something that is good but difficult to reach. We can think of it as an optimistic feeling about things. This emotion (like any emotion) is neither morally good nor bad. It depends on what we do with it. If this optimistic feeling is in accord with reality (Actually, yes, I *am* able to make that putt!), then it should be encouraged. In those instances, the emotion can assist the will. If this optimism is not in accord with reality (I'm going to play in the PGA!), then it should be rejected. Either way, it's not a virtue but just a feeling.

Another distinction is that the theological virtue of hope is not founded on our own abilities, or those of anyone else, or any earthly power or resource. Again, we often speak of "hoping" in what others – people, programs, science, medicine – can do for us. This might be a natural kind of hope that looks to natural realities and strengths and sees reason for confidence in the future. But it is wholly unsuited to the kind of content necessary for authentic Christian hope. It often fails on a natural level also. The sadness of many during the pandemic was caused precisely by a misplaced confidence – hope – in what medicine, science, and the state can accomplish.

Marxism famously dislocated hope from eternity to time, from heaven to earth. It introduced the thought that we ourselves can correct things and achieve the perfectly just society. Every politician traffics in this false notion of hope, putting himself forward as the one who can solve all the problems or proclaiming that "we are the ones we have been waiting for."

Or, more sentimentally, people speak of children as "the hope of the future." (Which is ironic in a culture that expends enormous amounts of money to *avoid* having children.) Now, there's a certain truth to this outlook, since having children is a vote of confidence in the future. P. D. James's novel *The Children of Men* shows how hopeless (naturally speaking) society becomes without children. Still, in the end we don't hope in children. Indeed, we shouldn't impose on them the burden of all our hopes. Nor should we do that to any other human person.

No, the glory for which we hope cannot be attained by any human or worldly power. So, our hope must come from beyond ourselves and beyond our world.

### Schedule Update for Pew Removal for Reupholstering

During this week of January 13th, the remaining pew seats will be reupholstered. Half were redone last week.

- Monday, January 13th and Friday, January 17th, the Noon Mass will be held in Monsignor Heller Hall.
- The pews removed on January 13th will be returned on January 17th.
- As a result, our weekday Mass seating capacity of 800 will be reduced by about half.

The reupholstering is being performed at no cost to the Church due to a problem with the original installation of the seat cushions in 2017.

There will be no School Mass this week. This work impacts <u>only</u> <u>our weekday</u> Masses.






