On The Way

Saint Francis: The Franciscans

No religious order in the Church ties itself so profoundly to the person of its founder as Franciscans do to Francis. There's a great irony in that, because Francis never intended to establish an order. He had neither the taste nor the talent to do so. Indeed, he hated having any authority and never aspired to be a founder or superior. He only ever wanted to be little brother Francis. The founding of the Franciscans came about by necessity, in response to the popularity of his charism and the need to channel it properly.

In 1208 Francis was living as a penitent attached to the little church of San Damiano. He lived a life of poverty, serving the lepers and repairing churches in the area. Inspired by his example of departure from the world, other young men from the region soon came to join him. This wasn't something he knew how to handle. As he put it years later, "When God gave me some brothers, there was no one to tell me what I should do." He first took as guidance three passages from Scripture: Mark 10:17-21, Luke 9:1-6, and Matthew 16:24-28. Those combined to give three simple rules for his new community: give all to the poor, take nothing for the journey, and take up your cross.

But because Francis knew he was no founder, he sought official approval. He and his new companions made a pilgrimage to Rome to submit their way of life to Pope Innocent III. Meanwhile, Innocent had had a dream in which he saw a friar holding up the crumbling Basilica of Saint John Lateran, representing the Church herself. When Francis arrived, Innocent recognized him as the figure in the dream and was immediately well disposed to this new group. Indeed, he gave them more than they anticipated, not only confirming their way of life but also commissioning them to preach. The upshot was that they left Rome as clerics, not just lay penitents. Francis himself was ordained a deacon.

The little group returned to Assisi and made the church of Santa Maria degli Angeli – the Porziuncula or "the Little Portion" – their home. They continued their penance, prayer, and work. But now the Franciscans expanded rapidly. And as their numbers grew, so did their mission field, expanding beyond Assisi to all of Europe. Still, Francis resisted any grand plans or ambitions for his order. In 1216 – when the Franciscans had become much larger than ever expected – Francis began referring to them as the *Fratres Minores*, the "Lesser Brothers." Despite its growth, he insisted on the smallness of the community.

The growing pains that afflict any organization plagued the Franciscans especially because Francis's charism was so strong and intensely personal. The codification of his way of life in a rule to be lived by others was lightning in a bottle. Not surprisingly, controversy attended the development of the rule. So, for example, in 1220 Francis cut short a missionary journey and returned to Italy to override some ambitious superiors who imposed stricter norms for fasting than he envisioned. On one occasion he refused to enter a town in which he thought the Franciscans, in violation of the strict poverty he wanted, owned a building. On another occasion, suspecting a similar violation, he climbed up on the roof of the building and began removing the tiles.

Despite all of this – and despite his severely limited administrative abilities – Francis accomplished what many founders fail to do. He provided for the transition of leadership and the continuation of his Lesser Brothers. He handed over the reins to another friar and became little brother Francis once again. The community he had never intended to establish had found firm ecclesiastical footing even as it benefited from his continuing example.

Summer Reminders

Now that summer is here and family schedules change due to vacations and school being out, remember that “Just as your vacation takes planning and discipline to make happen, so also we must keep certain disciplines in our leisure so that we maintain our identity as children of God.” Below are some ways to maintain your identity as a child of God.

- **Mass.** In your travels, make sure you plan ahead so that you can make it to Mass every Sunday, wherever your travels take you. The site www.masstimes.org is a great resource to help find the most convenient Mass.
- **Confession.** Go to confession monthly...take your children...and then take them out afterward for dinner or dessert. Just as the 40 days of Lent lead into the 50 days of Easter, so our repentance should always lead to rejoicing!
- **Rosary.** At some point this summer, you will find yourself on a flight or long drive. Plenty of time to pray the Rosary! In fact, the time between when you take your seat on a plane and take off is about the time it takes to pray a Rosary. *So, make sure you have your Rosary with you, in your pocket or in your purse*, so that you can give that time of prayer to God whenever the opportunity pops up.
