### On The Way

Saint Augustine: The City of God

In 410AD, the unthinkable happened. The city of Rome fell. The Visigoth King Alaric, an on again/off again ally of the Empire, sacked Rome and loosed his men upon the city for three days. They pillaged the city of its treasures and led many citizens into captivity. Rome had not fallen to a foreign army in nearly 800 years. Although some years earlier Rome had ceased to be the administrative capital of the Empire, it continued as its symbol of enduring power and majesty. Its fall sent shock waves and refugees throughout the mediterranean world.

The fall was felt keenly by the Northern Africans, not only because of the refugees who arrived on their shores but also because of just how Roman their culture was. In his youth, Augustine himself had become an expert on the Roman orators and writers. He had gone to Rome itself because that was *the* place to advance in scholarship and renown.

Now, decades later, having become a Christian and having tended Christ's flock for years, Rome's fall has a different meaning for him than it would have before. The world had been shaken by the event, and Augustine needed to help make sense of it for his people. So the fall of Rome occasioned one of his greatest works, *The City of God.* It was, in his own words, "a massive and arduous work," and took him almost 15 years to complete. Once complete, it served as one of the most important texts for the rest of Christian history. Charlemagne, for example, used to listen to reading from the book when at table.

The first purpose of *The City of God* was to exonerate the Christians. In the aftermath of Rome's fall, many blamed the Christians. The city fell, so they argued, because the worship of and sacrifices to pagan gods had been abandoned for Christianity. Augustine spends almost fully half the book reviewing the history of Rome and observing that their cruel and capricious — indeed, dehumanizing — gods had never quite cared for the city.

More importantly, *The City of God* wrestles with the perennial question of how Christians are to live in this world with their hearts and minds set on another – how to be in the world but not of it. The fall of Rome, the "Eternal City," had shaken people's confidence in the seemingly almighty empire. If Rome had fallen, where was one to find anything lasting and enduring? It's not an irrelevant question for us, who live in times of similar upheaval and societal change.

Scripture tells us that "our citizenship is in heaven" (Phil 3:20) and that "here we have no lasting city, but we seek the one that is to come" (Heb 13:14). Building on these teachings, Augustine explains how the two cities vie for our hearts. Or, rather, how they are based on our hearts, as each city is founded on a different love. The city of man is based on self-love. The city of God is based on love of God. Augustine traces out how devotion to these cities has characterized the history of angels and men.

Now, it's not simply that we are to live here in the city of man until the city of God appears on the last day. Rather, we are to live according to that true eternal city, to shape our lives and our communities according to its truths and structure. Because the city – the Kingdom – of God is a present but not yet perfected reality. It is present here already in the Church. Christians form what Augustine calls a "civitas peregrina" – a pilgrim city, a community of believers that makes its way through this world while already living according to the City of God.

### **Thank You to Saint James Parishioners**

Shelter House would like to express their appreciation for our parish's overwhelming support of their Amazon wish list site this summer. Our Social Outreach Committee has supported this organization for years which helps the homeless and/or victims of domestic violence. This is the only family shelter that needed every day essential items including hygiene items,

formula, diapers, and detergent. In June, the shelter received over \$700 in donations and almost \$1,000 in July thanks to our parishioners.



Shelter House closed their one location in April and relocated to Fair Ridge which allows 85 residences versus 9 in the old location. There are currently 49 families living there and they can stay for up to one year. Families are given bed linens and cleaning supplies when they move in.

In addition to your child's birth certificate, you will need to provide the following:

- Baptismal certificate if your child was not baptized at Saint James
- Tuition (check or cash)
  - $\Rightarrow$  \$140 for one child
  - $\Rightarrow$  \$190 for two or more children
- Letter from the school or parish program if your child was in another Catholic school or Religious Education Program
