

Saint Augustine: Donatism and the Sacraments

The Donatists insisted that the Church's members be sinless. All the more did they insist on perfection in their bishops and priests. They could not abide a lapsed cleric (i.e., one who had handed over the sacred books during persecution or otherwise failed in witness) administering the sacraments. In their view, the infidelity of the minister rendered the sacraments invalid. Those bishops and priests needed to be re-baptized and re-ordained before they could return to ministry.

What this position ultimately came to mean was that the sacraments depended on the moral character of the minister. In taking such a position, the Donatists raised an important question about the sacraments and occasioned Saint Augustine's important and lasting clarification.

It all centered on a simple question: What makes the sacraments effective? According to the good ol' Baltimore Catechism, a sacrament is An outward sign, instituted by Christ, to give grace. But how does it give grace? The Donatists insisted that the grace given depended on the minister's personal holiness. A sinful minister could not celebrate a valid sacrament.

Now, it should be easy to see what a big theological problem this is. If the sacraments depend on the holiness of the minister, then you would need a minister as holy as the sacrament. But no minister can ever possess the personal sanctity necessary to administer any sacrament. If Baptism required a priest holy enough to baptize, there would be no baptisms. If the Mass depended on a priest with a holiness sufficient to the Sacrifice of Christ...there would be no Mass.

This quickly becomes a pastoral nightmare because it brings uncertainty into the hearts and minds of the faithful. Was that priest sufficiently holy and without sin to baptize my child...to hear my confession ... to say Mass?

God doesn't want his people to be uncertain about the means of salvation. Indeed, the sacraments are given by Him not only as effective means of grace but also tangible indications of it for our benefit. The external celebration reveals to us what is being done interiorly to give us confidence about what we cannot see. But if the sacraments depend on the personal holiness of the minister, then the faithful are no longer certain about their effectiveness.

Augustine entered the debate to defend, not so much the ministers, but the sacraments themselves. In so doing, he introduced into Catholic theology one of its most important principles. Namely, that the sacraments are effective by the very working or celebrating of them. (The Latin shorthand of this teaching is Ex opere operato – that the sacraments are efficacious from the worked performed.) Baptism, for example, doesn't depend on the holiness of the minister. It depends on the pouring of the water and the speaking of the words, "I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

The Church's ministers are earthen vessels (see 2 Cor 4:7) through whom God imparts divine grace. It is Christ Himself Who baptizes or forgives sins or offers Mass – the priests are the means by which He does so. It is not as himself or on the basis of his own sanctity that a priest celebrates the sacraments. He acts in persona Christi – in the person of Christ. Or, rather, it is Christ working through him, as a writer uses a pen.

Saint Augustine's insight in this regard bears witness to the truth that, despite the sinfulness of her members, the Church possesses an authentic and real holiness. In this case, it is the sacraments themselves, as Christ's gifts and means of grace, that impart sanctity – no matter how weak and sinful the ministers may be.




Part-time Receptionist Needed

Natural Family

Planning is the general title for the scientific, natural, and moral methods of family planning that can help married couples either achieve or postpone pregnancy. The methods are based on the observation of the naturally occurring signs and symptoms of the fertile and infertile phases of a woman's cycle. No drugs, devices, or surgical procedures are used to avoid pregnancy. Since the methods of NFP respect the love-giving (unitive) and life-giving (procreative) nature of the conjugal act, they support God's design for married love!

Any adults who need to take the 4-hour Virtus training class as part of their diocesan background check, Saint James will be offering a course here in Monsignor Heller Hall from 8:00am-Noon on Saturday, September 13th. Classes do fill up quickly, so if you are interested or have questions about the background check process, please email Kara Rider, krider@stjamescatholic.org, to check your status or to learn how to proceed with a background check and Virtus class.

According to the Policy on the Protection of Children/Young People and the Prevention of Sexual Misconduct and/or Child Abuse, all employees of the Catholic Diocese of Arlington—all direct employees of any parish, diocesan school, or diocesan office—regardless of contact with children must attend safe environment training within 45 days of submitting their Office for the Protection of Children and Young People (OPCYP) application.



Additionally, any volunteer with a ministry that either works with minors or has substantial contact with children <u>must attend</u> a safe environment training like this. However, training attendance alone is not sufficient for compliance with the policy.


Highlights of the tour included Giorgione's Adoration of the Shepherds, where the Christ Child lies on a white cloth, set apart from His mother and the shepherds in a composition evocative of Eucharistic adoration. Another striking moment came with Raphael's Alba Madonna, a luminous tondo depicting the Virgin Mary cradling the Christ Child and John the Baptist. Notable details—such as Our Lady gently marking her place in a sacred text with her finger, and the subtle foreshadowing of the Crucifixion—revealed layers of meaning that made the painting all the more poignant.


