On The Way

Catechesis on the Eucharist: Sinai Sacrifice

The Mass makes present the "new and eternal" covenant established by Christ on the Cross. The words of consecration refer to the "Blood of the new and eternal covenant" or "the new covenant in [Christ's] blood" (Lk 24:20). This language is familiar because we hear it at every Mass. It is also strange because animal sacrifice is not a reality in our culture. But for the first hearers of the Gospel and the first participants in the Mass, the language was familiar and strange for other reasons.

It was familiar to those first Christians because of their Jewish roots. They understood that a covenant with God was established by sacrifice and communion. They knew well the accounts of Abel, Moses, and Abraham offering sacrifices. They were deeply familiar with the Old Covenant (Testament) established by Moses at Mount Sinai (Ex 24). An appreciation of that scene should help us understand the Mass as the fulfillment of the Old Covenant, of all that the Lord had promised.

On that occasion, Moses descended from his time with the Lord on the top of the mountain. "When Moses came to the people and related all the words and ordinances of the Lord, they all answered with one voice, 'We will do everything that the Lord has told us."" Then, with that profession of faith, he offered burnt offerings and the sacrifice of bulls to the Lord. He "took half of the blood and put it in large bowls; the other half he splashed on the altar."

Then, he once again received from the people their profession of faith: "Taking the book of the covenant, he read it aloud to the people, who answered, 'All that the Lord has said, we will hear and do.' Then he took the blood and splashed it on the people, saying, 'This is the blood of the covenant which the Lord has made with you according to all these words.'"

The same blood of the covenant sprinkled on the altar (signifying God) was also sprinkled on the people. It was the sign of communion, of that sacred kinship that they now had with one another. That is what a covenant is, a sacred kinship, God introducing us into his family. The blood was the sign and the ratification of it.

The whole scene anticipates the Mass. First there is the proclamation of God's Word (the readings and homily) and the people's assent (the Creed). Then there is the offering of sacrifice and the communion in the victim's blood.

It must have been earth shattering for the Apostles to hear Jesus proclaim his own Blood as the Blood of the New Covenant. Those words were strange to them because they reveal, first, the establishment of a Covenant greater than the one at Sinai. Second, they reveal that the sacrificial victim of the New Covenant is not animals but Christ himself. All the sacrifices of the Old Testament – from Abel's to those in the Temple on Good Friday – find their meaning and fulfillment in Jesus' sacrifice on the Cross. Finally, Jesus' words "Take this all of you and drink from it" revealed that the Blood of the New Covenant is received not just externally, by sprinkling, but *interiorly*, by our reception of Holy Communion.

The sacrifice at Sinai was the defining moment for the Israelites, the rite by which they were introduced into sacred kinship with the Lord. The Mass, although bloodless and simpler, is the re-presentation of that moment when we, by communion in sacrifice, are introduced into a and holy covenant with Almighty God.

1949 — A Permanent Kindergarten Is Established

In 1949 the first Kindergarten class began in St. James School. The Kindergarten was first located in the white house behind the convent that was once occupied by Villa Maria Academy. Later Kindergarten classes were held in the Primary wing of the school when it was completed in 1955.


