

# On The Way

Saint Augustine: Give what you command...

Is the Christian life possible? It is possible to love one another as Christ loves us (Jn 13:34)...to love our enemies and pray for our persecutors (Mt 5:44)...to be perfect as our heavenly Father is perfect (Mt 5:48)? Can we actually live these teachings? Such has been a constant question throughout the Church's history. Christ seems to ask of us what is far beyond our ability.

In our own day, people extend this dilemma to other, even more basic, teachings of the Church. Is permanence in marriage possible? Can people really be expected to live the sexual morality that the Church teaches? Is chastity possible and part of the Good News?

The Pelagian response was a resounding *Yes, we can*. Indeed, even without Christ's grace, if we just try harder, then we can meet all these moral standards. Martin Luther's answer was that the impossibility of Christ's teachings – in particular, the Sermon on the Mount – is simply to reveal our inadequacy and fallenness. In other words, He doesn't really mean it. The modern solution is to ignore the high demands and reduce Christianity to niceness and toleration. We might be able to clear that low bar.

None of these is satisfying. But Saint Augustine provided a pithy, beautiful solution to this perennial dilemma. In *Confessions*, he prays, *Da quod iubes et iube quod vis* ~ *Give what you command and command what you will*.

The first part of this prayer – Give what you command – is an appeal for God's grace. It means, in effect, Give me the grace to live what you command me. But we have to be careful here. We cannot reduce God's grace to just a spiritual boost when we need it, like a divine energy drink that empowers us to do difficult things. Yes, God does give actual graces that inspire and strengthen us to think, speak, and act in a Christlike manner in certain situations. But these are at the service of sanctifying grace given us in the Sacraments and which makes us partakers in divine life, other Christs.

It is because He has conformed us to Himself by sanctifying grace that Christ commands us to do what He did. We don't fulfill the commands in order to become like Christ. We have already been configured to Him by grace. The commands are really just a description of what it means to live out the life of Christ infused into our souls. Hence the second part of Augustine's prayer: *Command what you will*. In other words, if He gives me the actual graces to live what He has made me by sanctifying grace, then He can command whatever He wills. It's already part of who I am. This tremendous confidence in God's grace to transform us and to live virtue is why Saint Augustine is called the "Doctor of Grace."

The saints show us that Augustine's prayer is not a vain hope or futile aspiration. Throughout the Church's history – from Saint Stephen, the first martyr, to Saint Maximilian Kolbe at Auschwitz – we see saints forgiving their enemies and remaining faithful to Christ even unto death. They did so not by their own strength or merits but by His grace. They were confident that they could live His commands because they knew His life and grace dwelled in them.

And so also for us. Christ's commands – to forgive, to remain faithful, to remain chaste, etc. – simply call out from us what His grace has already given. We cannot do these things by our own power, and we discourage ourselves by trying to do so. It is by His grace dwelling and deepened within us that we live what He commands – indeed that we continue His own life and presence in the world.

# Life Corner

Understanding the Ramifications of the Proposed VA Constitutional Amendment on

Abortion—During the month of March, the Life Corner spotlighted dangers in the proposed abortion amendment to the Virginia Constitution. It is clear that this proposed amendment is to enshrine abortion rights into our VA state Constitution. This proposed amendment is in opposition to our Catholic faith which teaches us to respect the dignity of all human life from conception to natural death.

We are called to protect life, and the proposed amendment endangers life. Its vague and overly broad language invites dangerous interpretations by the courts in the future.

- It undermines parental rights by limiting parents' ability to protect and guide their children.
- It legalizes abortion for both adults and minors, without distinction.
- The wording could open the door to expanding abortion rights to a wide range of "reproductive rights," including contraception
- It could even be used to overturn Virginia's current ban on taxpayer-funded abortions.

# What can I do?

- Pray for the mother and for the protection of the child she carries in her womb.
- Be informed. Know the candidates' position on this amendment before you vote.
- Attend the meeting on Tuesday, October 14th, at Saint James and learn about the impact of this amendment (see page 8).

Saint James will hold an Arlington Diocese-sponsored informational meeting on the Abortion Amendment that will be moved along or halted depending on voting in November. The amendment will be explained on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>October 14th</u>, at 7:00pm in the church.



Because we failed to turn out the pro-life vote in November of 2023, when every seat in the Virginia General Assembly was on the ballot, we currently have an extremely pro-abortion majority in both the House of Delegates and the Senate which is fast-tracking this dangerous resolution. This year, every seat in the house of delegates is once again on the ballot.

This amendment is out of step with the values of a majority of Virginians.

It goes far beyond what Roe v. Wade allowed.

# **Amendment Process**

First Session - January 2025

• The amendment was approved for the first time by both legislative chambers. The Governor cannot veto an amendment.

We are here

7 November 2025 Election

A general election must occur before the amendment is taken up in the next session. On Tuesday, November 4th we have an opportunity to return a pro-life majority to the Virginia House of Delegates. This would stop the amendment from being passed a second time. *Are you registered to vote?* 

Second Session - January 2026

The amendment is introduced for the second time and must pass both chambers with unaltered language. A pro-life majority of delegates would stop the amendment at this juncture.

November 2026 Ballot Initiative

The amendment, as passed twice, goes to the ballot for the people to vote "yes" or "no" to amend the Constitution.

- Parental consent laws: Eliminated.
- Abortions up to birth: Guaranteed.
- Religious liberty: Denied.
- Health of women and girls: At risk.
- Taxpayers: Forced to fund abortion.
- Predators:
   Protected.

This amendment could turn Virginia into the abortion destination of the South.
