On The Way

The Ten Commandments: VIII You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.

We cannot live without truth. Animals are happily unconcerned about it. But we desperately need it. First, human society needs truthfulness to govern relationships. If nobody respected and spoke the truth, then every word would be in doubt. We would have no basis to trust any contract, agreement, or relationship. Further, the human person aspires to more than the creature comforts. We want to know what is true and to conform our lives to it. Wealth and luxury without truth are a misery. Hence, we have "deaths of despair" in the midst of our affluence. Conversely, this is why men and women have endured all kinds of deprivation (imprisonment, torture, even execution) out of fidelity to the truth. Martyrs reveal that life without the truth is not worth living. As Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn famously commanded, "Live not by lies."

So, the eighth commandment protects not so much our physical life (as do the prior commandments) as our spiritual life, what distinguishes us from the animals. It speaks of our obligation to the truth – to seek, grasp, adhere to, and conform ourselves to it. Alone among God's creatures in this world, the human person has this mission. If we are not striving for it, then we are sinking into that kind of life that we have in common with the animals, to be warm and well fed and without meaning.

Our obligation to seek the truth means that we have the corresponding right to seek and speak the truth. This is the reason the Church defends religious freedom. Each person has that right, not because all religions are equal (Catholicism alone has the fulness of the truth) but because all persons have the duty to seek the truth and especially the ultimate truth, which is God.

Specifically, this commandment forbids lying – that is, the deliberate speaking of something contrary to what one has in mind. This prohibition first protects our personal integrity. To lie is to divide ourselves. The liar knows one thing and speaks (or writes or posts or otherwise conveys) another. This prohibition also protects society by ensuring that our interactions are characterized by truthfulness. Because we presume a basic honesty in people – that what they say is true – we are able to enter into relationships.

This commandment forbids rash judgment, the assumption as true some moral fault of our neighbor without proof or sufficient justification. It likewise forbids gossip, both making known the hidden faults of our neighbor (detraction) and repeating falsehoods that damage our neighbor's name (calumny).

This commandment has particular importance for two areas in our culture. First, social media. Much of what goes out on social media is rash judgment, detraction, or calumny. It fails to convey the truth in a manner worthy of the true dignity of the other person.

But the greatest lie currently in our culture is that of transgender ideology: that a person with XY chromosomes and male genitalia is a woman; or that a person with YY chromosomes and female genitalia is a man. This ideology lies to people about what a man and a woman are. It denies society the truth of the human person.

"Let your 'Yes' mean 'Yes,' and your 'No' mean 'No" (Mt 5:37). To avoid lying is a low bar. Christians are called to more – to witness to the truth about God, about the human person, and about his salvific love for us.

Parish Synodal Listening Session

Every three years, Catholic bishops from around the world gather in Rome for a meeting called the General Assembly of

the Synod of Bishops. At such synods they discuss matters of pastoral importance proposed to them by the Pope. For the 2023 Synod of Bishops, Pope Francis has chosen the theme of "synodality," which is a new word to most of us. According to the Vatican, synodality addresses "how the Church is journeying together, and prayerfully reflecting together on its journey, so as to discern God's will, and to pursue the pathways to which God calls us – towards deeper communion, fuller participation, and greater openness to fulfilling our mission in the world." In preparation for the 2023 Synod, the Pope has asked every diocese to undertake its own synodal phase of listening, dialogue, and community discernment. The bishop will then prepare a report summarizing the proceedings of these sessions, which will then be shared with synod organizers.



Father Scalia has scheduled a parish synodal listening session for Monday, March 28th at 7:00pm in Heller

Hall. All are welcome to attend. There will be an opportunity for people to respond to the different questions. A moderator will be on hand to guide the conversation and observe the time limits. Please note the following clarifications. First, the purpose of such listening sessions is not to dispute or reexamine Church teaching. Further, the questions posed by the Vatican ask for *observations*, so exhortations or lectures are to be avoided.
